His sole-authored articles have been cited extra-judicially by judges of the New South Wales and Queensland Courts of Appeal. He has received a Discovery Early Career Researcher Award (DECRA) and a Discovery Project (DP) grant from The Australian Research Council and a Sydney Research Accelerator (SOAR) Prize.

Ben serves on the board of *Sydney Law Review* and the board of councillors of The Francis Forbes Society for Australian Legal History. He is a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy (FHEA).

Ben was formerly a sessional academic at the Australian National University, a research assistant at Columbia Law School, and a judicial clerk at the NSW and ACT Supreme Courts.
