My research interests lie predominantly in post-Marxist and post-structuralist approaches to theorising the nature and durability of neoliberalism, with my research agenda situated at the intersection of political theory, international political economy, and public policy. My main body of research concerns the survival of neoliberal forms of governance during times of crisis, with a particular focus on international institutions such as the G20 Leaders Summits and Basel Committee for Banking Supervision. I am also interested in theorising the relationship between neoliberalism and the far right, foregrounding the roles of racial and gender hierarchies in structuring neoliberal capitalism.
