THE SAKDRISI GOLD MINING COMPLEX

Another view on prehistoric "Gold-Makers"

Thomas Stöllner Ruhr-University Bochum

When the Sakdrisi complex (SE-Georgia, Transcaucasia) was discovered more than twelve years ago and its significance began to be recognised, no one yet knew how much valuable information it was to offer. Mining, metallurgy, settlement and social structures are all inter-related as contemporary phenomena, permitting a variety of approaches to study and analysis of a gold mining society of the late 4th millennium BCE. The entire Kura-Araxes production chain can be reconstructed from the Sakdrisi complex. This important evidence has enabled the research team to understand the significance of gold production in daily life and how this influenced ritual practice and social structure.

Thomas Stöllner holds the Chair for Pre- and Protohistory at the Ruhr-University Bochum, Germany, and directs the Department of Mining Archaeology at the Deutsches Bergbau-Museum Bochum. His main area of research is the social and economic development of mining communities in Pre- and Protohistory, with a focus on mining, the archaeometry of mining, and the archaeology of technology and societal interrelation. His research areas extend from Central and East Europe to the Caucasus, the Middle East and Central Asia as well as South America.
