HISS 2024

In 2024, the <u>Hunt-Simes Institute in Sexuality Studies (HISS)</u> will bring together over forty emerging and established researchers working in sexuality studies, from a broad range of disciplinary perspectives. Supported by the <u>Sydney Social</u> <u>Sciences and Humanities Advanced Research Centre (SSSHARC)</u>, HISS is co-directed by Lee Wallace and Victoria Rawling. HISS is also timed to coincide with Sydney's <u>Mardi Gras celebrations</u>.

Queer-Led Classroom

HISS explores the notion of a <u>queer-led classroom</u> dedicated to embodied learning and knowledge building. Loosely based around familiar school subjects, spaces and experiences, HISS unfolds as a series of experimental workshops led by internationally recognized queer scholars and practitioners.

The Institute builds on the observation that all of us, young or old, established or emerging, have been students at some time and might usefully revisit that experience in a queer context. Activities include fieldtrips, school photographs and a formal – all teenage rites of passage that can strike fear in the hearts of queer kids.

Queer Relationality

In 2024, HISS explores the theme of queer relationality. Many of us work on relationality in one form or another. The 2024 HISS Faculty, for instance, have significant expertise in thinking about queer relationality in regard to sex, to others, to kinship, to history, to media, to genre, to games, to artificial intelligence, to methods, to space, to institutions, and to diversity. Many of our foundational experiences of these and other forms of relationality can be traced to school settings. The global rise of the marriage equality movement has recentred discussion of queer relationality in what many consider irrevocably heteronormative terms. By situating relationality in the context of schooling, learning and pedagogy, we hope to bring out new understandings of queer attachment, friendship, community, affect and thriving, which seems particularly important given the current clampdown on LGBTQIA+ inclusive education in many jurisdictions.

Norman Haire (1892-1952) studied medicine at the University of Sydney before embarking on a highly successful career as a sexologist and sex education reformer in Europe. Haire left his books and papers to the University of Sydney Library, where they can be accessed through the Rare Books Collection.

Dr Gary Simes (1950-2017) was a linguistic historian, bibliographer and University of Sydney graduate. The Hunt-Simes bequest is named after Dr Simes and his husband.



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
