SSSHARC Research Impact Accelerator

The Impact Accelerator consists of a four phased approach to developing opportunities and activities for impact. The Accelerator will support up to five research teams working across FASS's strategic research priorities (2024-2026). To be delivered in conjunction with the Sydney Knowledge Hub and Cruxes Innovation.

Phase Zero: Teams self-identify and prepare EOI for submission in Feb.

Phase One: Identify opportunities and pool available funding to explore research collaboration projects with external stakeholders to demonstrate engagement track record. Initial collaborative workshopto be held at SSSHARC between 18-29 March 2024.

Phase Two: Research Impact Masterclass for all five project teams. Facilitated by Cruxes and held at Sydney Knowledge Hub, 12pm 9 April 2024.

Phase Three: Coaching sessions for forward planning for research impact. 2-hour coaching session with each project team to develop roadmap and budget for strategic research activities (Cruxes & SSSHARC).

Phase Four: Plan and schedule activities to be supported by SSSHARC Project Officer.



What can research teams expect to gain from this Program?

Leadership Experience

- Project Leads will be responsible for the team and participation will provide demonstrable evidence of leadership
- · Coaching sessions

Collaboration Experience

- Opportunity to engage with colleagues, partners and organisations beyond individual silos
- · Cross-functional and multidisciplinary team dynamics
- · Two-way mentoring opportunities

Capacity Building

- Resources and support for projects that would otherwise not happen
- Space to think about research impact activities
- · Fine tune skills and capabilities around engagement
- Well-supported space for teams to explore innovation
- Training to identify opportunities, build track-record, and go after Category 2 and 3 funding
- Represents institutional investment that applicants can demonstrate in subsequent funding applications



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Eligibility

Project

Projects should aim to address a pressing social challenge and create positive change. Teams should identify at least one external stakeholder (partners/beneficiaries/end users) who would be interested in, could benefit from, or might influence the progress of the research.

Project Leads

- Each team should nominate a FASS academic in a continuing position as a Project Lead. Leads can be
 from Level B-D, but each team would ideally include an additional researcher on a level twice removed
 from the one held by the Project Lead. For example, teams led by a Level B academic would ideally
 include another researcher from Level D and teams led by a Level D academic would ideally include
 another researcher from Level B.
- Teams can also be co-led. One Co-Lead can be from a different Faculty/MDI. If two academics are coleading a team, they need to be from different career stages across Levels B-D. One may be on a fixed term contract.
- Level Es can be on the project team to provide mentoring and guidance, as well as participating in the research activities but, for capacity-building purposes, should not be named as Leads or Co-Leads.



Team Composition

Each team can have up to a maximum of five members but must include:

- 1. Up to two Project Leads who will be responsible for preparing and submitting the program application, identifying the project, nominating the team, role delegation, acquitting funding, interim and final reporting, and ensuring the team's sustained commitment to the project.
- 2. At least one additional researcher at any level from any School/Faculty at the University. This includes researchers on fixed term or casual contracts.
- 3. At least one HDR or Honours student from FASS.

Up to two additional team members can be named, including

- · Researchers from USyd or other Universities at any level.
- · People from mission-focused external organisations or service providers.
- Professional staff from the University of Sydney who could add strategic value in line with the project's vision, including those with community / advocacy / campaign building or project management experience.
- Other USyd Masters or HDR students with expertise appropriate to the project, such as those enrolled in Masters of Business Administration or Social Enterprise.

All team members must participate in the Accelerator. This will require a 10-hour time commitment in Phase 1-3, with an additional 10-20 hours estimated for Phase 4. As above, subject to threshold requirement, an assigned Project Officer will dedicate up to 0.3 FTE to each project in Phase 4.



Applications & Key Dates

Applications will open in February 2024

- Up to five teams will be selected through a competitive process on based on an expression of interest (EOI) and narrative CVs.
- Potential applicants (either individuals or teams) are encouraged to contact SSSHARC to discuss their proposals before submission.
- SSSHARC may suggest additional collaborators or strategic directions for the application.
