

Flexible study options

Our courses are designed to fit around your work and your life. Delivered primarily online with short, face-to-face teaching blocks, they combine the flexibility of online learning with the benefits of in-person discussions.

You can choose to study full time or part time, and can increase, decrease or suspend your study load at any time.

You can also study at the level that suits you, with shorter graduate certificate and graduate diploma options, as well as more comprehensive master's courses available for most of our specialties. You can move between these levels of study as your needs and circumstances change (provided you meet the admission criteria).

Scholarships and funding

A range of funding opportunities are available to our eligible postgraduate students, including University and employer scholarships, Commonwealth Supported Places, and FEE-HELP and HECS-HELP loans.

Every year, six Susan Wakil Scholarships are awarded to postgraduate nursing students starting their degrees with us. These scholarships provide assistance for study, tuition and accommodation costs.
