<u>Jasper Garay</u>, Lecturer, Program Director of the Grad. Dip. Indigenous Health Promotion at Sydney School of Public Health. Jasper is a proud Darkinjung/Ngarigo Aboriginal Associate Lecturer living and working on Gadigal Country of the Eora Nation.

<u>Jaime Miranda</u>, Professor and Head of School, Sydney School of Public Health. His work brings together epidemiological and health policy aspects of chronic non-communicable diseases in low- and middle-income countries, with a focus on obesity, hypertension, diabetes, and mental health.

<u>Kate Owens</u>, Senior Lecturer in Environmental Law at the University of Sydney Law School and Director of the Australian Centre for Climate and Environmental Law. Her research combines both social and legal methods to address significant issues of environmental law and governance.

<u>Peter Sainsbury</u>, adjunct professor at the University of Notre Dame Australia and the University of Sydney. Peter retired as Director of Population Health in the South Western Sydney Local Health District in 2016. He is a past president of the Public Health Association of Australia (PHAA) and Climate and Health Alliance Australia (CAHA).

<u>Michelle Villeneuve</u>, Associate Professor at University of Sydney. Michelle leads the Disability-Inclusive Community Development research workstream at the Centre for Disability Research and Policy, the University of Sydney. She is an Activity Lead at the World Health Organisation Collaborating Centre for Strengthening Rehabilitation Capacity in Health Systems.

<u>Fiona Charlson</u>, Associate Professor at UQ. Fiona is a NHMRC Research Fellow at the Queensland Centre of Mental Health Research and School of Public Health, University of Queensland. She is a psychiatric epidemiologist and health services researcher with strong experience in addressing some of the most challenging global mental health research questions.

<u>Aditya Vyas</u>, recently joined the Sydney School of Public Health as the first Lancet Countdown Oceania Research Fellow, and adjunct senior lecturer at Curtin University. Adi is a public health physician and academic focusing on climate change, health system sustainability and global health governance. He has held senior leadership roles at the New South Wales Ministry of Health in Sydney, Australia and is a consultant for the WHO on climate resilience and environmental sustainability.

<u>Hasini Gunasiri</u>, PhD candidate at Deakin University and a HEAL scholar. Hasini Gunasiri is a PhD student in the Sustainable Health Network, School of Health and Social Development, and a member of the Institute for Health Transformation at Deakin University.

<u>Stanley Chen</u>, Surgeon. Dr. Stanley Chen is a highly experienced surgeon specialising in surgery of the liver, biliary system and pancreas. A Senior Staff Specialist in general surgery at John Hunter Hospital for 25 years, Stan has recently been active in promoting environmental sustainability in surgery, operating theatres and the hospital setting.
