Honours Application Information Booklet 2026

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AIM

To provide a fourth-year program accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) that will:

- enable you to apply for postgraduate study
 (e.g., Master of Clinical Psychology, Doctor of Philosophy, etc.)
- 2. permit provisional registration with the Psychology Board of Australia (N.B: only upon completion and acceptance into an accredited postgraduate program)

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

- one year of full-time study, consisting of:
 - Advanced Psychometrics (12.5%)
 - Advanced Seminars (2 × 12.5%)
 - Foundations of Professional Psychology (12.5%)
 - Empirical Thesis (50%)

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Internal students with a Bachelor of Psychology with an integrated fourth year (i.e., Bachelor of Psychology Honours degree), provided they have met progression requirements, OR:

- 1. a Bachelor's degree, or equivalent, from a recognised institution that was
- 2. obtained within the past 10 years; and
- 3. contained an APAC-accredited sequence of study in Psychology; and
- 4. has all requirements completed (e.g., 144 credit points for internal students); and
- 5. for the Faculty of Science (e.g., Bachelor of Science) at least a WAM of 65, and for Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (e.g., Bachelor of Arts) at least a WAM of 65 and psychology specific WAM of at least 70

(N.B.: this is the <u>minimum</u> eligibility criteria for Honours in Psychology, but it alone is not sufficient for being made an offer for Honours in Psychology)

SELECTION PROCESS

There is a not a set limit to the number of places in the Honours in Psychology program. Generally, places are under 100 and subject to staff availability each year.

We openly give preference to University of Sydney students and thus have very few places for external applicants - we reserve the right to place internal applicants exclusively if demand and quality is sufficiently high in any given year.

Entry into Honours in Psychology is based <u>solely</u> on academic performance in the <u>PSYC2 units</u> and <u>PSYC3 units</u>. (N.B: HPSC3023 or any TSP units or Dalyell units <u>taken in</u> place of PSYC3 units can count towards this criterion, but SCPU3001 cannot).

An Honours Application Mark (HAM) is calculated for each applicant, where the PSYC3 units are weighted twice as much as the PSYC2 units – a HAM calculator is featured in the same location where this document was found.

Internal Bachelor of Psychology or Bachelor of Psychology Honours students with an integrated 4th year are guaranteed to receive a place in Honours in Psychology so long as they maintain the progression criteria for their degree – any remaining places will be offered to all other applicants in a rank-ordered manner.

The threshold for receiving a place in Honours in Psychology can vary from year to year; historically, a HAM of approximately 75 has *usually* resulted in a place in the cohort for internal applicants. Please note that achieving the threshold HAM of 75 does <u>not</u> guarantee students a place in the cohort. The threshold HAM is much higher for external applicants given that we have few places available for external applicants.

Note that if a student enrolled in the Bachelor of Psychology Honours degree fails to meet progressions requirements they will be transferred to the three-year Bachelor of Psychology degree. However, if they still wish to be considered for honours they can immediately be considered based on HAM. Due to differences in how progression and HAM are calculated it is possible for a student who had not met progression requirements to meet the HAM criteria for admission as a Bachelor of Psychology student, if they submit the University application (as well as the School application) as described below for three-year degree students.

Please note that the School uses the HAM to evaluate applicants, but the Faculty uses the WAM. Because we have applicants from multiple Faculties (e.g., Science, Arts and Social Sciences), the School uses the HAM to evaluate applicants based on a common criteria. The HAM selection process from the School is one component of the selection process, but students must also meet the WAM criteria of their respective Faculty to be eligible for Honours.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Honours Pathway

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students are encouraged to apply and will be given priority admission including a modified HAM requirement. Applicants who wish to be considered for admission under the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Honours Pathway must provide evidence of their Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Identity in accordance with our <u>Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Confirmation of Identity Policy</u>.

HOW TO APPLY

Please note that there are different processes for applying for Honours in Psychology depending on your degree and where you completed it. The following section has information about how to apply for Honours in Psychology, but the exact steps you need to take will depend on your situation.

- Internal Applicants (University of Sydney integrated <u>Bachelor of Psychology(Honours)</u>) Step 2 <u>ONLY</u>
- Internal Applicants (University of Sydney <u>all other degrees, including the 3-year</u>
 <u>Bachelor of Psychology</u>) Step 2 and 3 <u>ONLY</u>
- External Applicants (from <u>Australian</u> institutions) Steps 2, 3, and 4 <u>ONLY</u>
- External Applicants (from International institutions) Steps 1, 2, 3, and 4

STEP 1 – APAC Accreditation

External applicants who completed their degree at non-Australian universities must have their undergraduate qualification assessed for equivalence to an Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) accredited sequence of study. The Australian Psychological Society (APS) is the national authority in Australia for assessment of overseas academic qualifications in Psychology. The APS will assess your psychology qualification for a fee: https://psychology.org.au/about-us/what-we-do/assessments/assessment-overseas-qualifications The University of Sydney and the School of Psychology cannot provide you with equivalence checks. Please do not pre-emptively send qualification evidence to the School – you will be contacted by the School if we require the evidence.

STEP 2 – School Application

All applicants <u>must</u> complete a School Application by 11:59pm (AEDST) on **Tuesday 6 January, 2026**. The School Application is completed in an online form – the link is available under the 'Psychology' subsection on the following page on the University's website: https://sydney.edu.au/science/study/undergraduate-courses/honours-in-science.html

When you submit your School Application, a receipt will be emailed to you. Please <u>save</u> the email receipt as a PDF, as depending on your situation, you may need it for some of the following steps.

STEP 3 - University Application

Submit your University Application <u>AFTER</u> completing your School Application. As part of your University Application, you will be asked to submit <u>proof of contact</u> with a supervisor. Please note, those applying for Honours in Psychology do <u>NOT</u> need to do this; instead, you must upload the email receipt of your School Application.

With regard to the University Application, depending on your internal/external status, and also the degree you completed, you will be applying for a specific degree –

- If you are an Internal Applicant who has completed an eligible **single bachelor degree** (e.g., Bachelor of Science; Bachelor of Liberal Arts and Science), you will apply for appended honours (e.g., Bachelor of Science (Honours), Bachelor of Liberal Arts and Science (Honours)).
- If you are an Internal Applicant who has completed the **3-year Bachelor of Psychology degree**, you will apply for <u>Bachelor of Science</u> (<u>Honours</u>).
- If you are an Internal Applicant who has completed the **Graduate Diploma in Psychology**, you will apply for <u>Bachelor of Science (Honours)</u>.
- If you are an Internal Applicant who has completed an eligible **single bachelor degree** (e.g., Bachelor of Science) and you completed **two majors** (e.g., BSc with the Psychology program and a major in Chemistry; BA with a major in English and the Psychology program, etc.), you will apply for appended honours (e.g., Bachelor of Science (Honours), Bachelor of Arts (Honours))*
- If you are an Internal Applicant who is currently enrolled in a 4-year combined Bachelor of
 Advanced Studies then note that from 2025 BAS is no longer available as an Honours
 pathway. BSc or BA students should apply for Psychology Honours through appended Honours
 (e.g. BSc(Hons) or BA(Hons)).
- If you are an External Applicant, and if you completed an eligible bachelor degree, you will apply for appended honours that aligns with your bachelor degree. For example:
 - Bachelor of Science (Honours) if your degree was in the Sciences
 - Bachelor of Arts (Honours) if your degree was in the Humanities
 - Bachelor of Commerce (Honours) if your degree was in Business or Economics

STEP 4 - Academic Reference

External applicants must arrange for <u>one</u> academic reference (e.g., University tutor, University lecturer, Professor) – this will only be requested from you if your application is

considered for endorsement by the School of Psychology, so you do not need to send this information until requested. If an external applicant is being considered and has been asked to send this information, the Honours Coordinator will assess the academic reference in light of the rest of their application and may or may not direct the University's Admissions Office to proceed with your application.

OFFERS OF PLACES

Although the School of Psychology will choose to endorse applicants or not, the actual offer for a place in the Honours in Psychology cohort will be made by the University's Admissions Office. Only the University's Admissions Office will communicate with you about your University Application; the School of Psychology will not communicate with you about your University Application. Only the School of Psychology will communicate with you about your School Application; the University's Admissions Office will not unless it is to advise you to attach documentation as evidence that you have completed the School Application.

With regard to the offer, successful applicants will be required to indicate their acceptance or refusal in a timely manner to the University's Admissions Office, according to instructions given by the University's Admissions Office.

All applicants should ensure that both the School of Psychology (i.e., in your School Application) and the University (i.e., in your University Application) are operating with the same contact details (i.e., same exact name, same exact email address, and same exact phone number in both applications).

Once offers are made, places will not be held for applicants who fail to respond to their offer by the deadline advised by the University's Admissions Office.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: There are two "Bachelor of Psychology" degrees at the University of Sydney. How do I know whether I am in the integrated Bachelor of Psychology Honours degree or the three-year Bachelor of Psychology degree?

A: The best way to determine this information is to review the code in your letter of offer. If it is BPPSYCHO3000, then you are in the integrated Bachelor of Psychology Honours degree. If it is BPPSYCHO4000, then you are in the three-year Bachelor of Psychology degree. The degrees also differ in number of credits in that the Bachelor of Psychology Honours degree requires 192 credits and the three-year Bachelor of Psychology only requires 144 credits.

Q: Is Honours admission purely based on HAM or a combination of HAM and other things (e.g., lived experience, research experience, volunteering experience)?

A: Due to the limited number of places available in the Honours cohort, applications are evaluated solely on the HAM. Additional work, research or other experience is not considered in the evaluation of applicants.

Q: My application in Sydney Student is asking for proof that a supervisor is willing to oversee my Honours studies – what should I do?

A: As part of your University Application, you will be asked to submit proof of contact with a supervisor. As noted above, students applying for Honours in Psychology <u>do not</u> need to do this. Instead, you must upload the email receipt of your School Application.

Q: I have already completed a postgraduate qualification – will this count towards my Honours Application Mark or towards my Honours components if I am accepted into the Honours in Psychology program?

A: No – entry into the Honours in Psychology program is based on academic performance in undergraduate psychology units <u>only</u>, and credit or advanced standing is not given to applicants with postgraduate qualifications.

Q: I completed some of my psychology units while on exchange at an overseas university – how will my Honours Application Mark be calculated?

A: For internal applicants, your Honours Application Mark will be based <u>only</u> on Units of Study completed at the University of Sydney. For external applicants, your Honours Application Mark will be based on whatever units we are able to determine contributed to your sequence of study in psychology.

Q: I completed SCPU3001: Science Interdisciplinary Project. Will this count toward my Honours Application Mark?

A: No – entry into the Honours in Psychology program is based on academic performance in undergraduate *psychology* units <u>only</u>, and the interdisciplinary projects offered to date do not meet the threshold for psychology content. However, the SCPU3001 unit will count towards the completion of the requirements of your broader undergraduate degree.

Q: I have relevant work experience – will this be taken into account when I apply for Honours in Psychology?

A: No – entry into the Honours in Psychology program is based on the Honours Application Mark only.

Q: I want to do Honours in Psychology the year after next, not the coming year – should I apply now and defer any offer that I get?

A: Only applicants enrolled in the integrated Bachelor of Psychology Honours can defer an offer into the Honours in Psychology program. Applicants from all other degree pathways (including the 3-year Bachelor of Psychology) <u>cannot</u> defer an offer. If you are an integrated Bachelor of Psychology Honours student and wish to be considered for a later Honours year, please only apply in the School application for that year.

Q: Can I apply for Honours if my transcript does not yet record me as having completed 144 credits (or I have other degree requirements to complete)?

A: This depends on when you expect to complete your degree requirements.

If you will not complete all your degree requirements by March 15th 2026, then you are not eligible for admission to honours in 2026. You will have to wait until 2027 (at the earliest). It is not possible to enroll in honours while completing your degree requirements, and we do not have admission to honours starting in Semester 2.

If it is plausible that you will complete your degree requirements by March 15th 2026 (e.g., you are waiting for a replacement exam, waiting for an exchange unit transcript, etc) then we can continue to consider you for honours for 2026. On the basis of your marks that are currently available we may offer you a provisional endorsement for honours or we may defer making a decision until more information is available. In either case you will not be able to enroll in honours yet but we may permit you to begin studying for honours. However, if after March 15th 2026 you have not completed all course your requirements and thus cannot enroll in honours, then you will have to stop studying for honours.

Q: [general questions concerning allocation to a Supervisor]

A: You can find out about prospective Supervisors by browsing the <u>School's research areas</u> and then searching for specific researchers (see the portal where this booklet was found). Please also review the 2026 document with a list of prospective supervisors and topics available on the <u>Honours website</u>. Please note that not all prospective Supervisors will be available every year for supervision of Honours students.

You are welcome to contact prospective Supervisors to ask them about what kinds of topics Honours students typically work on with them. However, it is not advisable to pitch research ideas to prospective Supervisors as the probability you will be allocated to that particular Supervisor is not high – research ideas should only be negotiated between students and Supervisors once allocations have been made.

In the School Application, you will be asked to rank the topics of interest to you – these rankings will be used to match students to Supervisors, but because some topics are more popular than others, not everyone will get allocated to one of their highest-ranked topics. The allocations are <u>not</u> based on HAM – once a student has been endorsed for a place in Honours, their HAM does not affect how they are allocated to supervisors.

Q: [general questions concerning coursework and the Empirical Thesis]

A: Students are expected to enroll in Honours on a full-time basis – the coursework in Honours is concentrated to Semester 1 (Advanced Psychometrics and both Advanced Seminars) and Intensive August (Foundations of Professional Psychology). Students can reasonably expect to have commitments every day of the week in those teaching periods, taking up to 10 face-to-face hours each week in Semester 1 and up to 4 face-to-face hours each week in Intensive August – this does not include any commitments for your Empirical Thesis, which takes place throughout the year (i.e., from the beginning of Semester 1 through to the end of Semester 2), with some periods of time being busier than others. Students who will be engaging in work outside of University should discuss time management with their Supervisor to ensure that students are dedicating an appropriate amount of time to their Empirical Thesis.

The Empirical Thesis is an individual project (although data collection might be shared with another student), but it will be designed in consultation with your Supervisor – it is advisable that you negotiate something that capitalises on your Supervisor's research expertise. Supervisors are expected to meet with their students once each week on average – at some points during the year (e.g., during data collection), you might meet less frequently than once a week, whereas at other points during the year (e.g., during data analysis), you might meet more frequently than once a week.

Q: How do we choose our Advanced Seminar topic? Is it in the School Application?

A: Students who have been endorsed for a place in the Honours cohort will be sent information about the descriptions of the Advanced Seminars that are available, and the timetable for these Advanced Seminars. Information on how to select the specific Advanced Seminars will be provided by the Honours Team to students who have been endorsed for the 2026 cohort and have accepted their offer.

Q: When does Honours start?

A: The official start to the Honours year begins with the Honours Orientation Day, which is usually the week before the semester begins. For 2026, it will be at some point during the week of 16-20 February. Students are not expected to meet with their supervisors until after orientation.
