Professor Stephanie Watson OAM is a corneal specialist known for her ground-breaking research in corneal therapies. She is head of the Corneal Unit at Sydney Eye Hospital, head of Corneal Research group at Save Sight Institute and chair of Australian Vision Research – previously known as the Ophthalmic Research Institute of Australia.

She is also the Deputy Director of Industry, Innovation and Commercialisation, Sydney Nano Institute. As a corneal specialist, she is appointed at the Prince of Wales and Sydney Childrens Hospitals. Professor Watson was the only Australian to make the Power List of the Top 100 women in Ophthalmology in 2021.



Dr Himal Kandel has been the Kornhauser
Research Associate at the Save Sight Keratoconus
Registry since January 2019 after completing his
PhD at Flinders University, Adelaide. For his PhD,
he was awarded the Vice Chancellor's Prize for
Doctoral Thesis Excellence, and South Australian
International Student of the Year award.

Dr Kandel has published over 50 research papers in reputed journals and has a special interest in patient-reported outcomes research. His research seeks to answer real-world questions in keratoconus management using the world first Save Sight Keratoconus Registry.



Larry Kornhauser OAM was diagnosed with keratoconus at age 12 and received a corneal transplant at 18. He went on to complete a Bachelor of Economics with honours and later completed a diploma of French language while living in France.

He worked for over 35 years as an economic journalist, first at the Australian Financial Review and later in France where he co-founded and edited an international newsletter for the energy sector. He also has worked as a translator for a range of international organisations and various economic journals. Since his return to Australia, he has also written articles on personal computing and done database development.

In 1999, he helped create Keratoconus Australia and became its inaugural president, a position he still holds. These days he also manages his family business and investment interests.

Larry has travelled extensively, played many sports, raised three children and never let his keratoconus dictate what is possible.



Mark Koszek graduated from the University of New South Wales in 1996, completed his Master of Optometry in 2002 and his Graduate Certificate of Ocular Therapeutics in 2012.

Mark is a founding partner and the Professional Education Officer of EyeQ Optometrists who have a network of 47 practices Australia wide. Mark has lectured extensively throughout Australia, New Zealand and Asia on contact lenses, dry eye and ocular diseases. Mark has a special interest in orthokeratology, miniscleral contact lenses, dry eye, ocular diseases and behavioural optometry.



Justine McLaughlin was diagnosed with Keratoconus in her late teens and managed it through glasses and hard contacts until an emergency corneal transplant in 2005. She has since had a further 2 corneal grafts, including one just a year ago. She is passionate about the importance corneal tissue donation plays in improving Keratoconus patient's lives.

She qualified as a solicitor and has spent the last decade in NSW Local Government as an elected Councillor and Deputy Mayor. She is currently a Committee member of Keratoconus Australia.



Dr. Yogambha Ramaswamy is a senior lecturer in the School of Biomedical Engineering at The University of Sydney. She commenced her academic career as a Vice-Chancellor's Research Fellow at the University of New South Wales. She was also a recipient of NH&MRC Peter Doherty Early Career Research Fellowship.

Dr. Ramaswamy has more than 10 years of experience in the field of biomaterials and tissue engineering and has made significant contributions to this field relative to opportunities. Currently, her research is focussed on utilizing biomaterials and nanotechnology platforms to understand the role of physical cues on stem cells and cancer cells.

Dr. Ramaswamy is the co-chair of the nanobioengineering cluster, Sydney Nano-Health at the University of Sydney.



Narina Janian works in the Advancement Portfolio at the University of Sydney where she engages with alumni and the broader community through a wide range of communications, events and engagement programs. She is responsible for working closely with people who wish to philanthropically support the Save Sight Institute's research and education initiatives.
