# Finding Us: The University of Sydney Law School

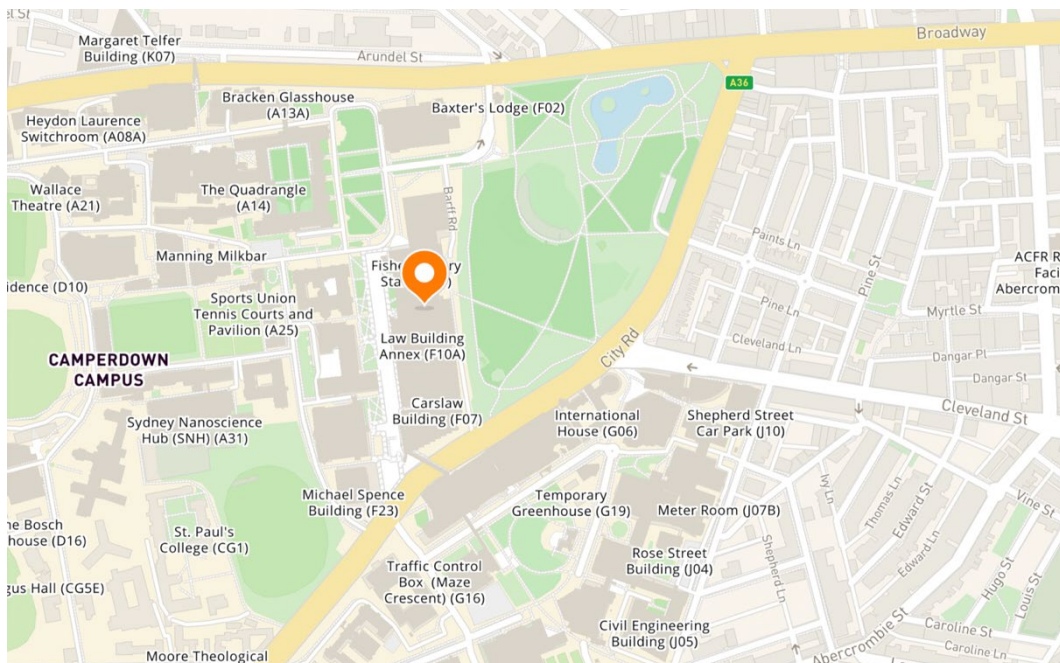


Sydney Law School is located at The University of Sydney's Camperdown Campus, situated on Eastern Avenue, between Fischer Library and Carslaw Building. The University has limited parking options and seeks to promote environmentally friendly transport options. If you wish to drive, timed parking is available in Forest Lodge, Glebe and Darlington, whilst the University has limited spaces available on

Science Road and Maze Circuit (off Butlin Avenue). Additionally, the Law School has limited parking accessible from Barff Road (off Paramatta Road).

If you wish to take public transport, buses travel down both Paramatta Road and City Road regularly. Recommended stops are City Road (corner of Butlin Avenue) or Paramatta Road (Footbridge). Alternatively, the University is a fifteen minute walk from Central Station or Redfern Station.

There are three main entrances to the University: Victoria Park, Footbridge (Paramatta Road), and City Road (at the corner of Butlin Avenue).





### Access from Victoria Park:

To access Sydney Law School from Victoria Park, you must follow the path running parallel to Paramatta Road directly toward the University until you arrive at the intersection of University Place and University Avenue, adjacent to Fischer Library and the front lawns of the Quadrangle. From here, you will turn left and follow Eastern Avenue for approximately 300m. The Law school will be on your left. Please note this route contains stairs.

Alternatively, once you have ascended the stairs, you may turn left at Barff Road and follow the road approximately 300m. At this point you will climb the stairs to your right and arrive at the Law School.

### Access from Paramatta Road/Footbridge:

Accessing Sydney Law School from Paramatta Road involves travelling down Science Road until you have reached the University's historic Quadrangle, before turning right and following the road parallel to the Quadrangle. You will then cross a pedestrian crossing and continue straight down Eastern Avenue for approximately 200m. The law school will be on your left.

### Access from City Road:

Accessing from City Road can be obtained by travelling directly down Eastern Avenue (toward Paramatta Road) for approximately 300m. The Law School will be on your right.
