### Introduction

The Indigenous Knowledge Place (IKP) is a dynamic and inclusive gathering place that brings together dialogue and knowledge exchange from Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities.

The Indigenous Knowledge Place (IKP) is an initiative at the University of Sydney School of Architecture, Design and Planning, established as a hub for Indigenous and non-Indigenous dialogue, knowledge exchange, and community engagement.

Grounded in the principles of the One Sydney Many People Strategy and the Walanga Design Principles, the IKP is a place to gather, honour, share, and embed Indigenous knowledge systems in architectural and built environment education, research, and practice.

IKP provides a hub for current and prospective students, academic and professional staff, researchers, industry and government partners to explore the School of Architecture, Design and Planning's commitment to Country and First Nations communities and cultural practices.

The IKP welcomes an Indigenous and non-Indigenous Community of Dialogue and Exchange (CODE) between students, researchers, designers, industry, government partners to elevate respectful dialogue and innovative programs.

It supports cultural continuity, celebrates the richness of First Nations ways of being, knowing and doing, and facilitates curiosity, understanding and action. This is a place for all to feel a sense of belonging and grow together.

Through teaching, research, yarning, exhibitions, workshops, and storytelling, the IKP facilitates cross-cultural sharing of knowledge locally, nationally, and globally.

Through the Indigenisation of curriculum, best practices in Indigenous cultural intellectual property and Indigenous data sovereignty protocols, pedagogy and research, we commit to inclusive learning that honours diverse ways of knowing. We build enduring partnerships with Aboriginal communities, grounded in trust, reciprocity, and shared leadership.

### About us

We gather as a group of experienced Indigenous academics and practitioners who bring a wealth of knowledge for dialogue and exchange to benefit Indigenous-focused self-determination.

Our philosophy is guided by the understanding that Country is the foundation of knowledge and memory, and that architecture, design and planning engages in respectful dialogue with these deep cultural landscapes. Country is the foundation for design and practice—it is a living entity that communicates spirit and stories to create dialogue.

We engage in genuine, ongoing dialogue with a community of guests. Through practices such as yarning and cultural immersion, we listen deeply to the stories, values, and aspirations of the people who have cared for Country for millennia. Co-design is a process to engage with all in collaboration with Country.

Architecture, Design and Planning becomes part of a network for storytelling to respectfully enact cultural narratives into the fabric of thought—through form, materiality, movement, and multisensory experience. These narratives honour the past, reflect the present, and inspire future generations.



By strengthening Indigenous governance and empowering leadership at all levels, we strive for a just, equitable, and transformative educational landscape that reflects and celebrates the richness of First Nations cultures.

We enact processes to shape built environments that honour and reflect the enduring relationships Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have with Country. Guided by the principles of the One Sydney Many People Strategy and the Walanga Design Principles we commit to designing places that are culturally responsive, responsive, enact an ethic of care, and are spiritually connected.

We engage deeply with Country to ensure that architecture, design and planning emerges as part of an ecology—respecting stories, rhythms, and knowledge systems.

Through dialogue and exchange, we are creating a Place that celebrates and nurtures belonging, supports Indigenous leadership and self-determination, and contributes to the healing and resilience of Country through shared cultural practices.

The IKP is a collaborative vision that embodies ways to gather and share knowledge and create conditions for Indigenous knowledge systems to shape the future of architecture, design, and planning. Our place is a critical activation that is codesigned with Indigenous voices and serves as a platform for collaborative future innovations.

We provide support through culturally safe spaces for Indigenous and non-Indigenous guests to thrive, mentor, and lead innovative discourse relationally with Country and Indigenous communities and cultures.

Our philosophy encourages the inclusion and integration of Indigenous knowledge into built environment disciplines, while also connecting with curriculum, pedagogy, research, and governance.

This Place will become a legacy experience to influence research, education, and community engagement into the future.
Recognising and celebrating Indigenous knowledge systems enacts inclusion, belonging and appreciations of Country for all guests who interact with Country as a foundation for research methodologies, ethics, and outputs.
