Report

Ms Elms' career in music began not as a singer, but as a violinist when she was Leader in the first Youth Orchestra in Melbourne. In the presentation address at the ceremony on 7 May, she was remembered for her enduring reputation as Mrs Sharpshott in the ABC's 'Village Glee Club'.

In the mid 1950s she received a scholarship to study in Paris, from where she went to Covent Garden. She made her debut in Verdi's 'Masked Ball' and from 1957 to 1959 was Principal Contralto.

At the end of the 1950s she returned to Australia where she has since based her career. She has encouraged the Young Opera Movement and been a highly significant figure in the maturation of Australian arts.

As wife of Mr Graeme de Graaf, until recently Director of International House since its founding, Lauris Elms has given great support to International House. Every year for the past 20 years she has given a recital to raise funds.
