Giving longer lives for those with bowel cancer

Dr Erin Shanahan is undertaking breakthrough research to improve outcomes for people impacted by bowel cancer.

“We think that if you’re eating less beneficial foods, the gut microbiome can start to produce products that

can damage the lining of the intestine or affect the cells that line the intestine, and that can start to drive those cells down the pathway towards cancer.”

Her work is made possible by a gift left in the Will of Elwin à Beckett who passed away in 2013.

Helping students reach for the sky and beyond

Liam Heidt always wanted to design spacecraft, but growing up in Western Australia meant options were limited for further study. Without the support he received from the late William Robson Sinclair’s bequest, he’d never have been

able to move interstate and follow his dream.

“The scholarship has meant I’ve been able to continue my goals.

“Since graduating from the University of Sydney in 2018, I’ve gone on to complete a master’s degree in aerospace engineering from the California Institute of Technology and have since commenced my PhD here too,” says Liam.

Enabling musicians to flourish

A generous gift in the Will of the late Verna Florence Dinham is helping young

musicians at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

2018 recipient, Ryan Nguyen, explains:

“It’s offered me a platform to springboard myself towards a higher standard as a pianist.

“A direct result of the scholarship was that I was able to participate in various masterclasses, alongside New York concert pianists Lisa Moore and Inge Rosar.

“It is with my deepest thanks that I express my appreciation to the late Verna Dinham.”

“I’m very impressed with the work that the University does on a voluntary basis with the animal pop-up clinics.

that the Sydney Institute of Marine Science is doing.”

“My legacy is very important to me. It means that after I’m gone, the money I’ve made while I’ve been on the earth, is used constructively, it will be used for research and be used for scholarships and it will be used as a contribution to the future.”

A GIFT BEATING THE CYCLES OF UNDER- PRIVILEGE

Marion Flynn (BA '81) was denied the opportunity of a university education as a young woman.

The subject of what she calls a dysfunctional upbringing, she wants to leave a gift in her Will that can create a better world for disadvantaged young people.

“My education was so important to me. I had a desire to go to university even when I was 14.”

Later in life, Marion completed her Higher School Certificate and enrolled at the University of Sydney. It made such an impression on her that she stayed, joining the English Department for 12 years.

Marion truly appreciates the power that high-quality education has to change lives and lift people out of disadvantage.

Through her volunteer work at a local crisis centre she says, *“I have met a lot of people who come from the same background I came from –*

and they have nothing. So I thought these people really need a bit of a lift.

“I chose to support the University of Sydney because, having worked here for so many years, I know the money won’t get frittered away.”
