About this guide

This unit selection guide is designed for **first year Health and Physical Education (HPE)** students (commencing 2022 onwards) in the Sydney School of Education and Social Work at the University of Sydney. If you are entering Years 2 to 4 of your candidature, you are considered a "continuing student" and you must use a different guide. Please <u>email your Program Support team member</u> about this immediately.

You really don't need to read all the pages in this document; however, you should read <u>pages 1 to 4</u> carefully, as well as the <u>pages referring to your TWO teaching areas.</u>

The last part of this document has a very interesting selection of pages that you might want to look at, after you have enrolled for your units of study in Year 1.

Please email your <u>Student Life Advisor</u> or the <u>program support team</u>, if you have questions about the units in your first year.

University Terminologies

This guide will use terms that you must remember, as your understanding of them will have an impact on your progression and unit of study selections.

Most units of study at this University are worth 6 credit points (cp). A **major** refers to a specific collection of 48cp, while a **minor** is a specific collection of 36cp. The collections are found in the Online Handbooks.

Most **second teaching areas** are worth 24cp, with a maximum of 12cp of 1000-level units. You have the option of expanding this to a minor, under specific conditions.

SSESW degrees can only be done on campus, so remote learning is not a possibility.

We expect all students to adhere to the Faculty's 90% attendance rule.

A few TIPS to remember

There are a couple of tips you should always remember when choosing your subjects in your first year.

- **TIP #1:** Required Major. The *only* required major for you is the Education Studies major, which accounts for 1/4 of your units throughout the four years. Your second teaching area counts for roughly another quarter, and the rest are your Health and Physical Education units.
- TIP #2: You need to make sure that the first year units you take will lead to your second year units. This unit selection guide has been designed with this in mind, so if the unit you want is not listed here, there is most likely a very good reason for it. If lost, always chat to your Program Support Officer and refer to the University Online Handbooks.
- TIP #3: Your units of study must always align with accreditation. During enrol-

ment, you must always refer to the unit selection guide to ensure that what you are enrolling in will not "go to waste". It is possible to graduate from this degree and **not** be eligible to teach, so you must be very careful in your selection. If the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) is not going to accept your unit, there is no reason why you should take it.

- TIP #4: You have to have a second teaching area. All teachers in the state of NSW need to have two teaching areas. HPE is your first teaching area, so you just need another one.
- TIP #5: Choose units carefully. The units you choose must have the code S1C or S2C. Do not choose S1CIJA or any combination similar to that unless you've already spoken to us about it.



A few MORE TIPS to remember

TIP #6 Please remember that you should choose two first year subjects for your second teaching area.

While the system might allow you enrol in 3 subjects) for your second teaching area, you must not do this. For example, if you want to be an English teacher, you have several ENGL1XXX units to choose from; that does <u>not</u> mean you can choose four ENGL1XXX units in your first year.

TIP #7 Unsure about your second teaching area? You can choose to do two different units for your second teaching area in your first sem BUT make sure you withdraw one unit before the census date.

In **Sample #1**, Pat wasn't too sure whether to take Business or Geography. Because he is not sure that he can do well in accounting, he has decided to enrol in Geography as well. He can then take the two Sem1 units side by side until Week 3 and then he can drop the unit he is not interested in.

TIP #8 Changing your units. It is <u>absolutely acceptable</u> to swap units until the Friday before classes start in Week 1. After Week 1, it becomes more difficult to add units. If you do want to drop units, please note this must be done before the census date, so that you can avoid academic and financial penalty.

We would also recommend that you use your elective space to study other topics within the HSIE space, such as Business Studies (WORK1003 or WORK1004), History, Geography, Legal Studies, or Economics (ECOP or ECON).



Ancient History

It is a requirement by NESA for Ancient History teachers to have also done one Archaeology unit on top of your Ancient History units. If Ancient History is your second teaching area, you can enrol in **one ARCO1XXX** unit in your elective space in Year 3, or choose a 2000-level ARCO unit in Year 2.

In **Sample #4**, Clara is unsure whether she wants to have Ancient History or Modern History as a second teaching area. She decides to take both ANHS and HSTY units in Sem 1, with the intention of dropping one of them by Week 3, well before census date. She can then change her Sem 2 unit sometime during Sem 1.



Drama

If you want to be a Drama teacher, you need to do specific units in Theatre and Performance Studies. In your first year, you have to enrol in *PRFM1601 Making Theatre*, and *PRFM1602 Dangerous Performances*.

Economics (as Political Economy)

If you want to be an Economics high school teacher, you HAVE TO enrol in ECOP1XXX units (Political Economy), <u>not</u> ECON1XXX (Economics). You can take ECON1XXX units as interest units, but that is not really advisable – however, at the end of the day, this is up to you. In order to be accredited to teach Economics, you HAVE TO enrol in *ECOP1001 Economics as a Social Science* and *ECOP1003 International Economy and Finance*.

English

English has the most number of first year units within the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. However, you should only do 12cp (2 ENGL1XXX units) in your first year, with **ENGL1017 as a core unit**. If you really, *really* want to, you can do 18cp (3 ENGL1XXX units) but that means you no longer have a back-up teaching area (see **TIP #6** on page 2), which we never recommend.

Modern History

Modern History students can enrol in any 12 credit points of HSTY1XXX units. If you only want to do a second teaching area (24cp), you can mix and match any which way you want – it truly does not matter.

If you want a minor, you must complete HSTY1001, a core unit.


Just remember that, for accreditation reasons, Modern History teachers must also enrol in *at least* one Ancient History unit. It is recommended that you enrol in an ANHS1 unit in your elective space in Year 3 or you can take an ANHS2 unit in Year 2.

Also for accreditation, one of your Modern History units must be Australian history, we have used HSTY1089 Australia Now! In the example, but there are also units focused on Australian History at 2000 and 3000-level.

SECOND TEACHING AREA ONLY: Business Studies

You can do Business Studies as a second teaching area (24cp) in the Secondary Education degree, as long as your first teaching area/minor is **NOT** Economics (Political Economy).

For a second teaching area, you need to enrol in *BUSS1030 Accounting, Business and Society* (Sem 1 or 2), and either *WORK1003 Foundations of Work and Employment* (Sem 1), or *WORK1004 Foundations of Management* (Sem 2) - NOT BOTH.

EAL/D

Teaching English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D) is fairly popular, because it is a versatile teaching area aimed to assist high school students from non-English speaking backgrounds in developing their English language skills. You can use these skills not only in the high school classroom, but also in adult learning centres where demand would be fairly high, due to the booming migrant population in Australia.

In order to get accreditation to teach EAL/D, you need to take units from the Linguistics (LNGS) Handbook.

LANTITE

The Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (LANTITE) is a federally mandated test for all students enrolled in primary or high school teacher education degrees. No matter what state or territory you aim to teach in Australia, you are required to pass the two test components, literacy and numeracy.

At the University of Sydney, you are expected to pass both LANTITE components within the first year of your degree. You will not be allowed to enrol in your final placement unit, without meeting the requirements of the LANTITE.

For Year 1students

You need to enrol in *EDLN2000 LANTITE*—in either semester. This zero-credit point unit has no impact on your timetable and your enrolment fees. Its main purpose is to help us track your progress in terms of completing both LANTITE components.

If you pass both LANTITE tests either during or after the semester of enrolment for EDLN2000, you will get an automatic mark of *SR (Satisfied Requirements)* against that unit.

If you do not pass both LANTITE tests during the semester of enrolment for EDLN2000, you will receive an automatic mark of *RI (Result Incomplete)*, which can remain your mark until the end of your penultimate year.

If you do not pass both LANTITE tests by the second semester of your penultimate year, you will receive a mark of **AF** (**Absent Fail**) for this unit and the completion of your final year may be delayed.

1. I want to study units that do not relate to my teaching areas. Can I do that?

If you are not required to do a minor, you do have 12cp of electives. You can use that to complete a minor, but it would be better to use this to supplement your learning.

2. Why is my unit selection so strict? My friends in the Arts degree can do whatever they want.

Unlike other students in most University degrees, Education students are required to align with NSW Education Standard Authority (NESA) rules. NESA will check your transcript at the end of your degree and you will only be given accreditation to teach if your units align with their requirements.

3. Can I do a double major?

This degree requires that you complete an Education Studies major. You don't have enough units to do a second major. You can do a minor if you want to, but unless NESA requires it, we won't necessarily recommend it.

4. Can I do this degree part-time?

This degree can be done full-time or part-time but please be aware that you can only progress in your degree if you have completed units within the previous year.

5. Can I go on Exchange in this degree?

You can go on Exchange but it may delay your graduation in this degree. The University website has an entire section for going on Exchange. Speak to your Program Support team member if you want more advice.

6. What is the LANTITE? When do I have to do it?

The LANTITE is a two-part exam which <u>all</u> NESA-accredited Education students must complete. For more information about this, <u>click on this link.</u> You should attempt both test components by the end of the second semester of your first year. You can take it now if you want to—there is no "expiry date" once you've passed both components. You should enrol in EDLN2000 <u>now</u>.

7. Can I change my teaching areas?

Only up until a certain point, and only if you choose the right units in order to be accreditation at the end of your 4-year degree. Please see your Program Director, or a Program Support Manager in Education 307, if you have ANY questions and concerns about your unit of study selection.

8. Do I have to do additional courses to be accredited as a teacher?

There are external requirements like first aid and anaphylaxis seminars but that can wait until the start of Year 3. Until you hear from the Professional Experience team, the Program Support team or your Program Director, don't do those just yet.
