The University of Sydney Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) 2023 Allocation Report

The Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022 require higher education providers to provide a publicly available report on student services and amenities fee (SSAF) allocations and actual expenditure for the year as part of their annual reporting and in the form approved by the Minister. This SSAF Allocation Report is the form approved by the Minister.

Additional reporting was introduced to allow for greater transparency and consistency in SSAF allocations and expenditure.

Please note, the information provided in this *SSAF Allocation Report* does **not** require auditing by a financial accountant. The SSAF <u>expenditure reporting remains unchanged</u>, more information can be found in the <u>Financial Statements Guidelines</u> for Table A and B providers, and in the <u>Financial</u>

<u>Viability Instructions: Applicants and Providers of FEE-HELP (FVI)</u> for all other approved providers.

SSAF Consultation and Achievements

The University of Sydney's Approach

The University of Sydney separated 2023 SSAF funds into 'base', 'contestable', and 'infrastructure' funding, a successful approach that has ensured that student organisations and other eligible areas benefit from a guaranteed funding foundation to support ongoing projects, while also encouraging funding recipients to address one-off student needs.

Base funding, a set funding amount that is reviewed annually, is primarily provided to the four independent student representative organisations that support the University of Sydney's students, i.e., the Students' Representative Council (SRC), the Sydney University Postgraduate Representative Association (SUPRA), Sydney Uni Sports & Fitness (SUSF), and the University of Sydney Union (USU). Base funding is also provided to the Office of Student Life to support student leadership training and the Careers Centre. Contestable funding involves one off projects for any additional funding from the SSAF funding pool for one-off services or amenities projects. Infrastructure funding is available to the same recipients as contestable funding, but for capital works projects.

Eligible parties submit proposals for projects to be funded by the SSAF that must align with key areas under s 19-38(4) of the *Higher Education Support Act 2003* (*HESA*). As a condition of receiving SSAF funds, recipients must use the funding only for the purposes outlined under the *HESA*. In early 2024, student organisations completed financial acquittals confirming expenditure on their SSAF services and amenities.

Consultation

The University of Sydney engages in ongoing consultation to better understand the most pressing issues faced by students and their priorities concerning the allocation of SSAF funds, both directly, through an annual survey that all students are invited to complete, and via the student representative organisations that serve the University's student body.

In July 2022, the DVC (Education) Portfolio held a consultation session with representatives from the University's student organisations regarding the 2022 acquittal and 2023 budget allocation process, including information on updated Commonwealth reporting requirements.

In August-September 2022, the SSAF Student Survey was held. The survey identified student priorities for funding and was provided to SSAF recipients to link 2023 funding applications with the survey outcomes.

In October 2022, the 2023 SSAF budget and allocation process was endorsed by the UE Education Committee. The budget paper included a proposal to increase the portion allocated to base funding, which was also endorsed. Representatives from the University's student organisations were involved in the Committee discussion about the budget, allocation process, and base uplift, providing a formal consultation point regarding the 2023 SSAF.

Following review by the SSAF Budget Allocation Committee, applications for base funding were provided to the December meeting of the UE Education Committee for endorsement. At this meeting, two additional items regarding SSAF infrastructure funding were discussed with student organisation representatives.

At the July 2023 meeting of the UE Education Committee, the SSAF Budget Allocation Committee proposed a list of contestable funding applications for consideration and endorsement. The item also included a discussion regarding the 2024 SSAF budget. Student organisation representatives, as members or attendees at the UE Education Committee meeting, participated in the discussion.

The 2023 SSAF infrastructure projects shortlist was endorsed by the new SSAF Student Consultative Group in April 2024, which comprises representatives from student organisations and will provide the formal consultation point for the SSAF going forward.

Achievements

With 2023 SSAF funding, student representative organisations, faculties, and professional units providing student support services were able to continue delivering vital ongoing services and new initiatives such as campus life activities, food and drink services, student-produced media, career advising services, sporting and recreational activities, legal aid services, health and wellbeing services, and support for student clubs and societies.

Achievements in 2023 included the following:

- Food-security-related programs, including provision of food pantry supplies and free lunches
- Legal advice and assistance, including support for international students concerning migration
 and visa issues; keeping students safe from scams; and providing advice to students experiencing
 housing and accommodation issues
- Events and activities during Welcome Week / Orientation to welcome new and returning students to the University of Sydney
- Sports training and sporting activities, including opportunities for students to learn a new sport and 'learn to swim' classes
- Support for student-produced media, including *Honi Soit*, *Pulp*, and *BlakOut*: *An Anthology of First Nations Students' Scholarship*

¹ Note: As per Part 2 of the *Higher Education Support (Administration) Guidelines 2022* (Administration Guidelines), students studying on a part-time basis must not be charged more than 75 per cent of the maximum SSAF that a higher education provider determines for students studying on a full-time basis. The term "part-time basis" means a study load of less than 75 per cent of the normal full-time student load for the period to which the fee relates. As per part 7 of the Administration Guidelines, the normal EFTSL value for a full-time student studying over a period of one year is 1.0.

³ Note: Students are categorised as full-time or part-time students based on the total EFTSL value of the units of study they undertook in 2023. For example, a student undertook a full-time study load in Semester 1 which was equal to 0.5 EFTSL and undertook a part-time study load in Semester 2 which was equal to 0.375 EFTSL. This student would be categorised as a full-time student in 2023 as the total EFTSL they undertook in 2023 was equal to 0.875.
