COVID-19 testing requirements for travellers from China, Hong Kong and Macau

The Australian Government has introduced additional COVID-19 testing requirements for travellers from China, Hong Kong and Macau. If you are travelling from these regions you must provide evidence of a negative COVID-19 test taken in the last 48 hours before your scheduled departure date. Welcome to Semester 1

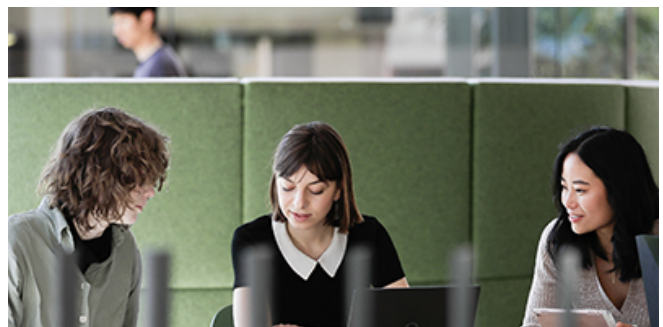

Re-enrolment and study in 2023

In Semester 1 2023, classes will be delivered on campus for onshore students. You will only be able to select remote units (units with the location code 'RE') if you are an international student studying offshore. Changes to parking on campus

The Pay As You Go (PAYG) parking system via the CellOPark app has replaced parking permits on campus. The PAYG system will better support flexible study practices by only requiring you to pay for parking for the days and times you park on campus, instead of on an annualised basis.
