

# Extreme heat and the University's operations

13 December 2023

Dear students.

With the Bureau of Meteorology forecasting temperatures of up to 38 degrees across Greater Sydney tomorrow, the University recommends staff and students work and study remotely where it is reasonably practicable, in line with the University's endorsed heat plan. You will be notified of any changes to classes or exams by your unit of study coordinator.

Ausgrid has advised us that following maintenance work, the network affected by today's power outage has been restored. However, higher heat periods can lead to vulnerabilities to our power networks, and a reduction in campus activity will lessen the load on our critical power infrastructure, reducing the potential for disruptions throughout the day.

In the event of further outages to University networks, the relevant building and area managers, Head of School and/or equivalent will be notified and communications will be distributed to the affected areas.

#### Staying safe in extreme heat

### **Extreme fire danger rating for Greater Sydney**

The Rural Fire Service has forecast an extreme fire danger rating for the Greater Sydney and Greater Hunter regions due to hot, dry and windy weather on Thursday 14 December. Total fire bans are in place for those regions.

Extreme fire danger ratings have also been forecast for Greater Sydney, Greater Hunter and North Western regions on Saturday 16 December.
