
National Reconciliation Week

Amendment to migration regulations

The Australian Government has issued a new regulation called the <u>Migration Amendment</u> (<u>Protecting Australia's Critical Technology</u>) <u>Regulation 22</u>, which it has indicated will apply to students granted a visa from 1 July 2022. This means if you are a current student, you are bound by the existing conditions on your student visa and will not be impacted by the new regulaton.

The new regulation will see changes to student visa conditions, which may mean additional requirements for higher degree by research students who want to change their course or research topic. The Government is consulting with higher education providers to define what the critical technology requirements will be, and the University is providing input to try to minimise any impacts on students in future. We will keep you updated as more information becomes available.
