Census date is approaching

For most students, census date for Semester 1 is next Tuesday 2 April. Census date is the last day you will be able to <u>withdraw from any units of study</u>, <u>finalise your residency status</u>, <u>suspend</u>

<u>your studies</u> or <u>discontinue your course</u> without it affecting your grades. Each unit of study has a census date, based on the session in which it is taught, so it's important to <u>check when your census date</u> is.

If you have questions about census date, please contact the Student Centre as early as possible. You can <u>make an appointment to visit the Student Centre in-person</u>, <u>make an enquiry online</u>, or call the Student Centre on 1800 SYD UNI (1800 793 864).

The Student Centre will be open over the mid-semester break but closed during the Easter public holiday this weekend, from Friday 29 March to Monday 1 April.

Secure up to \$3000 to launch your next big idea

Student Life Grants provide funding for innovative project ideas that benefit your student community. They also give you the opportunity to make a real impact, develop your leadership skills, and add project management experience to your resume.

You can apply as an individual or a group to access up to \$3000 of funding and development support. Project areas eligible for funding include social activities and mentoring, professional development, community contribution and academic research.

Need to know

- If you started a new undergraduate or postgraduate coursework degree this semester, you
 must complete the Academic Honesty Education Module (AHEM). The due date is next
 Tuesday 2 April. Completing the module will ensure that you understand your academic
 integrity responsibilities as a student.
- The Good Friday public holiday is on 29 March and the Easter Monday public holiday is on 1 April. No classes will be held on public holidays.
- The Student Centre, Library and study spaces will remain open as usual during the midsemester break, but will be closed on public holidays. After-hours access to Fisher Library and the Law Library will be available over the public holidays, so you'll need your student card to get in and out.
- If you have a disability, medical condition, or carer responsibilities (temporary or ongoing)
 which may disadvantage you in your formal examinations, you may be eligible for

reasonable adjustments through Inclusion and Disability Services. To be approved for adjustments in your Semester 1 formal exams, you will need to apply to register, book a consultation appointment, and be registered with Inclusion and Disability Services by Wednesday 24 April.
