## Ask R U OK? Any day

### Need to know

• From Wednesday 4 September, the Student Centre will be temporarily relocating from the Jane Foss Russell (G02) building to Fisher Library Learning Hub (F03) for three months.

The Student Centre at Fisher Library will continue to operate from 9–5 pm Monday to Friday, with its usual services.

- NSW Health is asking the community to be aware of symptoms of Mpox following a recent increase in infections, mostly impacting men who have sex with men (MSM). Mpox often starts with small pimple-like sores and symptoms can also include mild fever, headache, fatigue, or swollen lymph nodes. - If you have a disability, medical condition, or carer responsibilities (temporary or ongoing) which may disadvantage you in your formal examinations, you may be eligible for reasonable adjustments through <a href="Inclusion and Disability Services (IDS)">Inclusion and Disability Services (IDS)</a>. You will need to apply to register, book a consultation appointment, and be registered with Inclusion and Disability Services by Wednesday 25 September to be approved for adjustments.
- The Australian Red Cross Lifeblood will be operating a mobile blood donation centre on Eastern Avenue 8.30 am–2:30 pm from Monday 2 September to Friday 5 September.
- The Services Portal will be unavailable from 1–3 am on Sunday 8 September for an annual upgrade of our University systems. Please avoid submitting any forms or support tickets during this time.
