Scholarships

With more than \$135 million in scholarships and prizes available every year, we're dedicated to supporting you.

We offer scholarships for a diverse range of circumstances and backgrounds, with categories including:

- academic merit
- living in a low socio-economic area
- coming from regional or remote Australia
- Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander status
- student exchange
- studying a particular degree or with a particular faculty.

It's easy to apply!

You can apply for most of our commencing domestic student scholarships by filling out just one form.*

You will need:

- a non-school email address
- a current UAC application with any University of Sydney preference listed
- your nine-digit UAC ID
- your half-year Year 12 report, HSC or exam trial results, or tertiary study transcript
- to answer three written questions.

Equity scholarships

If you have experienced disadvantage through your schooling – including financial hardship, disability or long-term illness, family disruption, or living in a regional or remote area – you may be eligible for an equity scholarship.

To be considered, complete our single scholarship application form (see above), as well as UAC's Educational Access Scheme (EAS) application at uac.edu.au/eas before 30 September 2026.

Scholarship spotlight

Chancellor's Award

This scholarship is awarded automatically to students who achieve an ATAR of 99.90+ (or equivalent). Recipients receive \$10,000 per year for the duration of their undergraduate degree course (terms and conditions apply).

MySydney Scholarship

This scholarship is awarded automatically to students who live in low socio-economic areas. You will receive adjustment factors that boost your selection rank, and \$8500 per year for the duration of your undergraduate degree (terms and conditions apply).

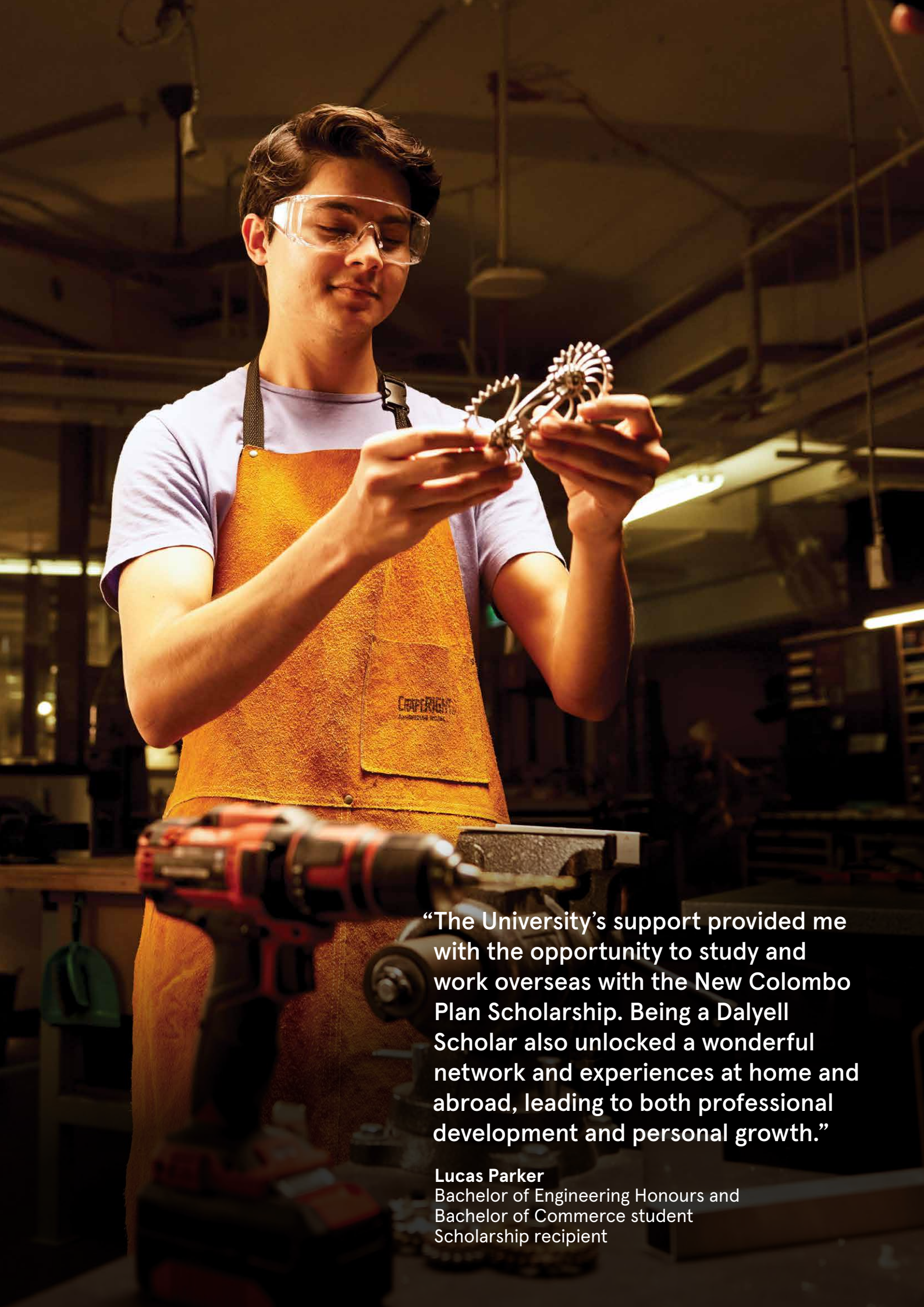

Our main Camperdown/Darlington campus is located on Gadigal land, just a few kilometres from Sydney's CBD. You'll be close to iconic Australian landmarks like the Sydney Opera House, the Royal Botanic Gardens, and Darling Harbour.

Accommodation

Your home on campus. Experience uni life right at your doorstep by living on campus. There's a whole range of accommodation options close to campus to choose from.

Residential colleges

A great way to make the transition to independence, offering three catered meals a day and a strong support network.

University residences

Affordable, self-catered, on-campus accommodation managed by the University.

Homestay

Affordable accommodation where you live with a local family and experience everyday Sydney life.

Independently run accommodation

Independently run complexes include UniLodge Kensington in partnership with the University of Sydney, Sydney University Village, Y Suites, Scape and Iglu.

Application dates

Application dates depend on the type of accommodation you are applying for. Residential college application dates vary between colleges, with some opening as early as March. Applications for University residences open from late September/early October.

Planning your *finances*

Get a clear understanding of university costs and the support available to help you plan your finances.

Course fees

Most domestic undergraduate places at the University of Sydney are Commonwealth supported places (CSPs), meaning course fees are subsidised by the Australian Government to reduce the cost for students.

The remaining cost, which you'll need to pay by the payment due date for each semester, is called the Student Contribution Amount (SCA). You can find an estimate of the SCA for your course under 'Costs' on the relevant course page at sydney.edu.au/courses.

Each calendar year, the Australian Government classifies each unit of study into a student contribution band according to the study area of the unit (not of the course, which might be different) and its study load, and sets a maximum SCA for each band. This means that similar degrees cost similar amounts across public universities in Australia.

Living costs

If you'll be living out of home for the first time, you'll need to create a budget to make sure you can cover all your expenses, including accommodation, food and groceries, entertainment, travel and uni costs.

This might feel overwhelming at first, but getting a clear picture of your expenses can make it much more manageable. For more information about living costs and how to build a budget, visit sydney.edu.au/study/living-costs.

Other costs

In addition to your course fees there are other expenses to consider, including the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF), the cost of textbooks and other course materials. For more information, visit sydney.edu.au/study/other-costs.

HELP loans

Eligible domestic students can choose to defer the payment of their SCA and SSAF by obtaining a HELP loan from the Australian Government. HELP loans are also available to assist eligible students with the costs associated with overseas study experiences.

Build your *Sydney experience*

Undergraduate courses are the first step after high school, preparing you for jobs and further study. You'll gain knowledge and hands-on skills, and graduate with a bachelor's degree.



Combined degrees

In a combined degree, you study two bachelor's degrees concurrently in an integrated structure.



Postgraduate study

Study a bachelor's degree followed by a master's degree to achieve your career ambitions and help you stand out.



Honours

Pave the way to further research or demonstrate your critical thinking and communication skills with an honours degree.

The shared pool

In some degrees you have the flexibility to study a second major or minor across different disciplines through our shared pool of majors and minors. You can choose from over 100 disciplines. This is a great way to branch out and diversify your knowledge. For example, you could study a Bachelor of Arts with one major in Chinese Studies and another major in Chemistry. Dalyell Scholars stream

As a Dalyell Scholar, you will access enrichment opportunities that extend your academic and leadership abilities. You can fast-track your learning with early access to advanced subjects and connect with academic and industry mentors to build professional skills. Beyond the classroom, you'll participate in a range of domestic and international activities to develop a global perspective.

If you achieve an ATAR of 98 or above (or equivalent) and receive an offer for a degree that includes a Dalyell Scholars stream, you will be invited to join. Some entry schemes allow admission to the Dalyell Scholars stream with a lower ATAR. Learn more about the benefits, additional opportunities, and courses that offer the Dalyell Scholars stream.

Units of study

Units of study are the individual subjects that you undertake each semester to make up your degree. Some are required (core units of study), while others you can choose (elective or selective units of study).

Majors and minors

A major is a sequence of eight units of study from a related area, and a minor is a sequence of six. These are part of your degree and will be included on your transcript when you graduate, e.g. a Bachelor of Science with a major in Physics and a minor in Microbiology.

Semester

Each academic year is made up of two semesters, and you will generally study four units per semester. You can also choose to study during an intensive session and complete units in a compressed timeline.

Entry schemes and admission pathways

There's more than one way to gain entry to your dream degree. Our entry schemes make the most of your ATAR by recognising your circumstances and achievements. Admission pathways may help you access a course, even if you've started in another degree or have taken a break from study.

Equity schemes

MySydney Entry and Scholarship Scheme

MySydney supports students residing in low socio-economic areas by offering adjustment factors, an \$8500 yearly scholarship for the duration of your degree, and a range of additional support. You will be automatically considered for this scheme based on your residential address as provided in your UAC application. No separate application is required.

Educational Access Scheme

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) supports students who have experienced significant educational disadvantage or disruption during Year 11 and/or Year 12 (or equivalent). Depending on the course and the severity of your circumstances, you may be eligible for up to 10 adjustment factors.

To apply, submit an EAS application through UAC at uac.edu.au/eas.

Regional and Remote Entry Scheme

This scheme offers adjustment factors and access to the Vice-Chancellor's Global Mobility Award valued at \$5000. You will be automatically considered based on your residential address or school as provided in your UAC application. No separate application is required.





Merit schemes

Academic Excellence Scheme

This scheme recognises high performance in advanced levels of English or mathematics. If you are completing an Australian Year 12 qualification or the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma, you may be eligible for up to five adjustment factors in addition to your ATAR or equivalent IB score. No separate application is required.

Elite Athletes and Performers Scheme

This scheme recognises students whose training, rehearsal, competition and/or performance commitments have significantly affected their Year 12 (or equivalent) studies by awarding adjustment factors.

Apply through UAC at uac.edu.au/eaps.

Future Leaders Scheme

Year 12 students who complete high school in Australia, receive the highest ATAR or IB score in their cohort, and apply through UAC are eligible to receive adjustment factors through this scheme in recognition of academic achievement. No separate application is required.

Faculty schemes

Creative Arts Special Admission Scheme

For some music and visual arts courses, our Creative Arts Special Admission Scheme (CASAS) gives domestic high school students a chance to receive an early offer of admission before the release of ATARs (or equivalent). Eligible applicants are assessed on a combination of academic performance and audition/portfolio requirements.

Portfolio Admissions Pathway

The Portfolio Admissions Pathway is for students who wish to apply for an architecture or interaction design course* and expect to achieve close to the required ATAR (or equivalent). Students submit a portfolio of design work and a letter of recommendation from their school to be considered for this admission pathway.

Interstate ATARs

Interstate students who complete an Australian Year 12 qualification and receive an ATAR can apply for courses through UAC. Interstate ATAR applicants are eligible for all entry schemes provided they meet all other eligibility criteria. For application information, equivalent subjects and grade requirements, visit uac.edu.au.

Other qualifications for admission

We recognise many secondary education qualifications from around the world. Check the 'Admissions' section on the relevant course webpage to see if we have an indicative entry score available for your qualification.

You may also be eligible to apply for admission based on a completed diploma or advanced diploma, bachelor's degree studies, the Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test, the Tertiary Preparation Certificate, or a university preparation course accepted under the Mature-age Entry Scheme. Some qualifications are only accepted if you are eligible for admission through a specific entry scheme, and some courses can only be applied for if you are a school leaver.

International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma

IB Diploma applicants receive an ATAR-equivalent rank based on their IB Admissions Score (IBAS). IB applicants are eligible for all entry schemes provided they meet all other eligibility criteria. For an IBAS conversion table, equivalent subjects and grade requirements, visit uac.edu.au.

Other admission pathways

If you don't get directly into your chosen course, there are other pathways that may be available to you.

- Complete one year of full-time study in another bachelor's degree, then apply to transfer to your preferred course.
- Complete a relevant undergraduate degree, then apply for a postgraduate course in a competitive area such as law, medicine or veterinary medicine.
- Apply for our Special Consideration for Admission Scheme if you have experienced disruption to your secondary or tertiary studies.



Did you know?

Domestic school leavers with an Australian interstate Year 12 qualification or IB Diploma are eligible for all our entry schemes.**

For the MySydney Entry Scheme, Regional and Remote Entry Scheme, Future Leaders Scheme and Creative Arts Special Admission Scheme, you must also have been residing in Australia while undertaking your secondary education qualification.

Understanding *entry and admission*

Selection rank

Your selection rank is your ATAR plus any adjustment factors you may be eligible for. If no adjustment factors apply, your selection rank will be equivalent to your ATAR.

The selection ranks listed in the Admission Guide (pages 20-23) are indicative of entry requirements from the previous year and can be used as a guide. The actual selection rank required to be made an offer for a future intake will depend on course demand and availability of places.

Entry schemes

The Admission Guide (pages 20-23) outlines the indicative ATAR required for admission through most of our entry schemes. If the lowest selection rank required to receive an offer for an intake increases or decreases, the corresponding entry scheme ATAR will increase or decrease accordingly.

Gadigal Entry Program ATARs are available online. The number of adjustment factors awarded for the Educational Access Scheme depend on the severity of your circumstances and the maximum number of allowable adjustments for the course. Creative Arts Special Admission Scheme offers are made prior to release of ATARs. These schemes will have a ✓ listed rather than an indicative ATAR.

Adjustment factors

Adjustment factors do not alter your ATAR but instead increase your selection rank for a particular course at a specific institution. You cannot combine adjustment factors from different schemes.

Non-ATAR qualifications

If you are applying with a recognised, non-ATAR qualification it will be assessed and converted into an ATAR-equivalent selection rank. If eligible, adjustment factors will be added to this rank.

Prerequisites and assumed knowledge

Prerequisites are particular subjects that you need to have completed (at the required standard) to be eligible to receive an offer of a place in your chosen course.

Assumed knowledge is the expected level of understanding you will be assumed to have when you start a particular course. You can still receive an offer without having met the assumed knowledge. If you do not meet the assumed knowledge, you can undertake a bridging course to prepare for your course.

Our prerequisites and assumed knowledge refer to the minimum subject requirements in the NSW Higher School Certificate (HSC) curriculum. For example, our prerequisite of Mathematics Advanced Band 4 refers to the two-unit HSC subject and grade.

If you are completing a non-HSC Australian Year 12 qualification or the International Baccalaureate

(IB) Diploma, visit uac.edu.au to see equivalent subjects and grades for your qualification. sydney.edu.au/study/prerequisites

Bridging courses

If you don't have the assumed knowledge for a course, we recommend that you undertake the relevant bridging course(s). Otherwise, you might find it difficult to manage the work, as your lecturer will assume you are familiar with this area of study.

Bridging courses are also useful if you struggled with the subject in high school or need a refresher. Bridging courses do not satisfy prerequisites; they catch you up on assumed knowledge. sydney.edu.au/students/bridging-courses

Inherent course requirements

Inherent requirements are essential tasks and activities necessary to be able to achieve the core learning outcomes of a course. They are specific to a particular course or discipline – for example, working with children, or completing fieldwork tasks. sydney.edu.au/students/inherent-requirements

Applying for Dalyell Scholars

You will be invited to become a Dalyell Scholar if you achieve an ATAR of 98 or above and receive an offer for a degree that includes a Dalyell Scholars stream. Some entry schemes allow admission to the Dalyell Scholars stream with a lower ATAR.
