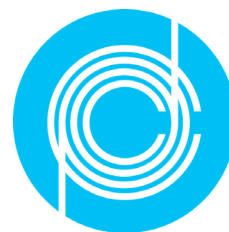

Professor Anne Kelso AO

Professor Kelso is the CEO of the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC). NHMRC initiated the NHMRC Partnerships for Better Health funding scheme to bring together key stakeholders to define and work on research questions and implement findings into policy and practice.



Janice Besch

Ms Janice Besch is the Director of the NHMRC National Institute for Dementia Research (NNIDR) and Chair of the CDPC Board. As a key element of the \$200 million Boosting Dementia initiative, the NNIDR provides the opportunity to rapidly translate evidence-based dementia research into policy and practice.
