## **Open Letter to the Chancellor**

Dear Chancellor,

We are writing as senior members of the University of Sydney with regard to the recently advertised search for a new Vice Chancellor. We recognize that universities throughout Australia have not been well supported by government over the past decade and that COVID-19 has increased the challenges for any new incumbent in this position. Nevertheless, this is a critical moment for the University and as leaders responsible for academic development across a broad range of disciplines, we thought it important to bring a number of key concerns to your attention:

- We feel strongly that the new Vice Chancellor should be a peer of outstanding scholarship and integrity. A major University cannot be run in the same way as a public company without risking damage to its scholarly identity.
- Students and their teachers form the core of every university, and a Vice Chancellor, along
  with senior management, needs to support their mission. This should involve collaboration
  between a Vice Chancellor, professors and other academic staff at every level of governance.
  Unrelenting emphasis on change management can often detract from the achievement of
  excellence in teaching and research.
- As Stefan Collini notes in his book Speaking of Universities (2017): "The abolition of departments, or their supersession by larger units or by interdisciplinary centres and programmes, which is so fashionable in Britain and Australasia, essentially weakens academic autonomy and empowers managers." The University of Sydney has a long and distinguished history of academic achievement in research and teaching that stretches back 170 years, and any incoming Vice Chancellor should respect those traditions and seek to build on them.
- In recent times, marketing has become such a dominant force that even the University's founding motto was removed from its crest and slogans appeared on buildings around campus that, in the eyes of many students and alumni as well as staff, seemed to undermine the University's standing rather than enhance it. Though this strategy fits with a "modernization" agenda, there is evidence that it may risk becoming counterproductive if pursued further. Indeed, many students and potential sponsors (or donors) are drawn to the University precisely because of its rich heritage.
- Given that the object of the University of Sydney as prescribed in the Act is the promotion of scholarship, research, free inquiry, the interaction of research and teaching, and academic excellence, we urge the appointment of a Vice Chancellor who would consider all these objectives to be equally important.

## **Comment on related news item in Campus Morning Mail**

The Campus Morning Mail newsletter distributed Monday 18 May reported a letter sent to the Chancellor by the University of Sydney Association of Professors (USAP) on behalf of the Professoriate. We are concerned that the report reinterprets our suggestion that interdisciplinary institutes can "weaken academic autonomy and empower managers" to "a defence of discipline-based departments against supersession by interdisciplinary centres and programs". We agree that academic autonomy has been weakened and that managers have been empowered, but do not blame this on the multidisciplinary initiatives (MDIs) per se.

We strongly support the initiative to establish MDIs as a way of promoting innovative and dynamic research teams, and have all experienced the benefits of a number of MDIs including the Sydney Institute of Agriculture, the Sydney South East Asia Centre, the Marie Bashir Institute, the Sydney Policy Lab and Sydney Vietnam Centre. What has not always been well explained by our managers is the relationship between the structures and our disciplines and departments, and how the synergy stands to benefit teaching and research in the university. The University of Sydney has a long and distinguished history of academic achievement in discipline-based research and teaching that stretches back 170 years, without which true interdisciplinarity cannot effectively exist. These different structures should thus not be placed in competition with each other or with the disciplines.

Our concern is rather the need to defend the rigour of our disciplinary base against populist arguments for "job ready" graduates. As Professors we have experienced strong employment demand for our graduates, but our primary role is to train minds, not on-the-job training.
